My husband Mark helped 8 people have the amazing second chance of life. I'm doing this walk for them and in particular for Pete and Adam whom I have met.

I'm doing this for all the transplant recipients I know and their amazing stories.

I'm doing this for all other donor families who make the hardest decision in honouring their loved ones wishes so that transplants can happen."

Marilyn North kindly set up a Just Giving page to raise funds for the Donor Family Network in memory of Lesley Gray.

She and her team walked all of the Thames bridges in London -a total of 43,000 steps!



On her Just Giving page Helen Fort says,

"Along with my sister-in-law and a few friends we are each hoping to run/walk 100k in October to raise some funds for the Donor Family Network. Sadly we lost our amazing sister Rosie in 2017. Rosie had cystic fibrosis and was lucky enough to receive a double lung transplant which gave her a new lease of life. Everyone knew Rosie for her passionate and loving attitude toward life. She was a true advocate for organ donation and went on to donate her kidneys to give two others their second shot at life."





Sid Lamb

The sun shone at Scalm Park, near Selby on 5th October for the President's annual golf day.

Sid Lamb had his heart transplant 20 years ago at the Freeman Hospital, Newcastle thanks to a generous donor and their family. There were two false alarms before the successful transplant and following his recovery Sid embraced the spirit of Transplant Sport and competed in many British, European and World Transplant Games. He has a wonderful cabinet full of medals he has won in golf, shotput and even the 100m sprint, something he is extremely proud of.

Sid now dedicates his time to raising the profile of transplant related charities by holding his annual golf day around the anniversary of his transplant, funds raised going to a variety of transplant charities.

The golf day is always generously supported by his family and friends, local businesses and attendees, who enjoy the competition, raffle, great food and entertainment.

This year, 144 players were involved, using golf balls sponsored by the Donor Family Network.

Donor Family Network Trustee Karen went along to represent the charity.

The Network is extremely grateful to Sid and wife Carol for their generous donations over the years. Mahmud Nawaz shares his experience of organ donation in loving memory of his wife Sharon.

Mahmud and Sharon married in October 2002, looking forward to a long future together. However, less than two years later and at only 32 years old, Sharon suffered a brain haemorrhage on 15th March 2004, collapsing at home whilst getting ready for work. Mahmud tells us:

"The ambulance arrived really quickly, they tried to resuscitate her without success and she was rushed to Bradford Royal Infirmary whilst the doctors worked frantically. Then they came out and told me there was nothing more they could do and had I considered organ donation. I was devastated and felt so alone."

Fortunately the couple had already discussed organ donation.

Mahmud continues, "Of course the answer

was yes. Sharon was passionate about organ donation. My wife prepared me for making a decision at the worst possible time by telling me her wishes beforehand. Sharon was moved to Intensive Care, where the staff were amazing, showing such care for her and indeed for me. The following day the doctors did the brain stem tests. They confirmed that Sharon had suffered





á traumatic brain haemorrhage. Her death was peaceful—just 50 years too early.

Sharon's organ donation was successful. Although her heart and lungs could not be used her kidneys and liver (split into two) saved four people, including a toddler who was critically ill. Sharon loved children she would have been very proud of this. "

Since then, Mahmud has committed himself to advocating for organ donation. He joined the Oraan Donation Committees in Leeds and Organ Mid-Yorkshire, became an Donation Ambassador in 2018 and is Chair at Chesterfield Royal now Hospital NHS Foundation Trust.

He says, "this was Sharon's gift, not mine, to donate her organs—my memorial to her is to spread the word about organ donation and share my story and try to encourage everyone to register and tell their loved ones their wishes."

Mahmud has also got involved with the British Transplant Games, partnered with Westfield Health, a celebration of life bringing together the transplant community, being initially involved by being on the stakeholder board for the Games in Leeds in 2022.

He concludes, "I now attend the British Transplant Games which celebrates the success of transplantation. At the British Transplant Games 2023 in Coventry I had the honour of leading out the donor family team at the Opening Ceremony.

I am delighted to have exchanged letters this year with the boy Sharon saved, now of course in his early 20's. It is amazing to have that experience".

Celebrating organ donation across the UK in support of **#OrganDonationWeek**






Many donor families, transplant recipients and NHS Blood and Transplant staff "turned the peaks pink" for Organ Donation week.

Stands were arranged in many stores and hospitals where volunteers spoke to the public, encouraging them to talk to their families and numerous iconic buildings were lit up pink.


Register Donation was launched in 1994 year following a five campaign. An advertising campaign persuading people to join the register was launched. Advertisements were placed in national and local and newspapers leaflets the explaining





scheme were delivered to more than 19 million households.

The existence of the ODR has not only saved countless lives but has fostered a culture of generosity and compassion.



Specialist Nurse for Organ Donation, Mark Ainsborough has written a children's book, Freddie and the Magic Heart, with the aim of educating children about organ donation.

The story is about a young boy called Freddie who's mother is very ill. Freddie's dad tells him how his mum can still help someone by donating her heart.

Mark says: 'I just felt strongly that I wanted to write it down and see if it could be useful for someone. It helps young children understand that, even though they don't want to lose their loved one, if it can help others, sharing those special parts of themselves with someone who needs it can be a beautiful thing".

Freddie and the Magic Heart was self published through crowd funding, which raised \pounds 2,500, allowing copies of it to be sent to all organ donation centres in the country.

All profits from the book sales are coming to the Donor Family Network. We have recently received a payment relating to royalties from the book and are very grateful to Mark.

MCDICAL are NHS Blood and Transplant's contracted transport provider for the Uk's transportation of National Organ Retrieval Service (NORS) Teams, transplant organs & tissue and NHSBT personnel by land, sea and air. One of their drivers gives an account of his work:

"Nearly 17 years ago my enthusiasm for life was put to the test, when I developed kidney disease and I needed a transplant. I had to dialyse three times a day which was hard but I was determined to get thorough it! Unbeknown to me my wife was looking to become my donor and on 4th October 2012 I received my transplant.

Fast forward to today:

I have had the opportunity to give something back to this wonderful gift of life achieved through organ donation and today I work for IMT Medical Transport Limited as an organ donation driver. My role takes me back to the start of my journey and when I visit a hospital to either collect or drop off human organs, it is an extremely emotional experience for me for obvious reasons. An experience, which whilst emotional is so rewarding.

This role is not just about driving, there are a range of skills needed and amongst the safe and careful driving standards we have to be physically fit (loading and unloading), be able to navigate around great Britian and keep up to a schedule on the timings (ensuring what I have on board arrives on time), customer service skills (especially with NHS staff) and organisation skills. This is all brought together via our communications hub where the key is communication."



The WOODMORE'S have kindly set up a Just Giving page to raise some money in memory of Simon Woodmore. They climbed the Yorkshire Three Peaks, a classic trekking challenge in the Yorkshire Dales, summiting Pen-yghent (694m), Whernside (736m) and Ingleborough (723m) in less than 12 hours!

Simon's wife Michelle tells us more:

"Simon lived life to the full and I'm so grateful for the memories we have. We met when I was 19, a student nurse and he was a paramedic. We were married in 1995 just after my 21st birthday and blessed with two wonderful children, Gemma in 2001 and James in 2004.

Simon trained to be a vicar alongside working full time with the ambulance service. This led him to volunteer at a local prison in the pastoral department. He also volunteered with SARAID, a search and rescue charity who deploy around the world when disaster strikes.





He also helped with homeless charities and giving vaccinations to refugees in Calais. He was a very special person!

Simon was only 51 when he suddenly collapsed at home in September 2020 with a large stroke. He was blue lighted to our local hospital then transferred to London where he deteriorated. He sadly never regained consciousness and as we

consciousness and as we were in the middle of covid we were not allowed to be with him. Three days later we were allowed to visit to say goodbye.

It was at this stage that we were approached by the Organ Donor Team. Simon and I had discussed donation and I knew he was on the register. It made sense as he had given so much to others during his life .He was able to donate everything except his lungs which was great.

My son did a year of fund raising events for Simon which finished in July 2022 with the first Walk4Woody.

We decided to do a sponsored walk each year to raise money for different charities in Simon's name. This year, for our 3rd Walk4Woody a group of family and friends completed the Yorkshire Three Peaks on Saturday 4th September and raised money for the Donor Family Network.

It was a really tough challenge and of the 17 walkers who started, 10 managed all three peaks. I did the 1st and 3rd peak which meant starting with the group at 5.45am and finishing with them at 6.30pm. I was very ill with long covid so this was a great achievement for me.

The annual walks are a lovely way to bring family and friends together, to remember Simon and raise funds for charities."





Many of our donor families will have received a purple 'Hugga' at the time of donation, a gift from the Donor Family Network. We asked for feedback on these and Kate wrote:

"I can't remember how I initially found out about the Donor Family Network, the day Dad died was so emotional. I think it may have been a leaflet in some paperwork we received after his donation. I was immediately attracted to connecting with the network and filled in the online form. In a wonderful serendipity, the welcome pack, including the 'Hugga', arrived on day of my Dad's funeral. Even more significant, the colour purple—this was a significant



colour in relation to Dad. It really felt like a hug arriving in the post. I was highly anxious and extremely emotional and I sat at the end of my bed hugging the 'Hugga' .I slept with it for many nights. It has become symbolic for me. A reminder of Dad's gift, that through my grief could bring a tiny iota of hope. I think it's a brilliant and kind gift. It means a lot to me and has brought me a lot of comfort, and is by or in my bed most of the time."



The success of the British Transplant Games

Following a very successful British Transplant Games in Nottingham in August we can now look forward to next year's Games which will be held in Oxford from 31st July to 3rd August 2025. The opening event, donor run and some

of the sports will be held at Blenheim Palace, where there will be plenty of time to explore the grounds and the Palace. Final commitment will not be needed until May next year.
